

# **Staying Vigilant**

These days, most of us are starting to feel like wearing masks and practicing social distancing are now a part of our daily routines. But for many families, their lives lately have been far from normal. Because of the pandemic, many companies instituted work-from-home policies (our DEFHR office staff included), and sadly, countless people in the U.S. were left unemployed. "There are less eyes and ears on things right now," says DeEtte Hillman, DEFHR's Equine Programs Director. "Horses, depending on situation and age, can decline rapidly. If you see or witness anything that's concerning, make the phone call to report it. Don't wait. Don't stop watching out for them."

Though DEFHR is still closed to the public for the time being, we are continuing to work closely with animal control and law enforcement agencies with active equine cases and rescue situations. #### What to Do if You Suspect Neglect or Abuse

In the State of Maryland, suspected cases of abuse or neglect should be reported to the animal control organization or humane society for the county in which the horse is located. In other states, the procedure may be the same or you may have to contact a local law enforcement agency such as the police or sheriff.



In fact, up to 90 percent of horses in our rehabilitation program are affected by ulcers. One of our newest horses, Quiver (chestnut pictured), suffers from gastric ulcers and these treatments allowed us to provide her comfort immediately.
